2025 Lake Metonga Clean Boats Clean Waters

he Clean Boats Clean Waters program is important to help keep invasives from entering into Lake Metonga. Our inspectors are tasked to inspect for any type of plant life, zebra mussels, or other potential invasives on boats, boat trailers, boat motors, and other recreational equipment, including towables. If any plants or other items are present, our inspectors make sure they are removed before entering the lake and after leaving the lake. The inspectors educate the boaters about draining all water from boats and equipment, drain live wells and containers holding any catch, and using live bait.

Please do your part and make sure to follow these tips, as well.

The CBCW program is funded in part by a cost sharing grant between the Association and the DNR, in addition to funding from the Mole Lake Band of the Sokaogon Chippewa Community. Inspection reports are completed with each shift, and this information is entered into the Surface Water

Integrated Monitoring System (SWIMS) with Wisconsin UW Extension and the Wisconsin DNR. Additional data is prepared for the grant application and year end report, to obtain reimbursement funding.

To date, we have 3 inspectors that have inspected over 600 boats and spoke with over 1000 boaters, and will work over 400 hours between the North and South landings between Memorial Day

Thank you to Aryanna, Konnor and Grace for a great year! Aryanna and Konnor are planning to return next year, and we will be looking to hire 2-3 part-time summer inspectors for the 2026 season. This is a great opportunity for high school students and adults of all ages to help with the Clean Boats-Clean Water program, enjoy being outside, in sunshine and chatting with boaters and anglers. Bullhead 2025, Good Signs...

Il the efforts to bring down the bullhead population in Lake Metonga are working!

From ice out to the end of May there were a number of different fish surveys that took place on Lake Metonga. The walleye survey estimated 3.19 adult walleye per acre (good and consistent number from past years). The smallmouth bass survey estimated 19.27 adults per mile with 62.8% measuring >14 inches, 41.7% measuring >17 inches and 3.1% measuring >20 inches.

Thirteen largemouth bass were caught during this survey of which 8 were under 16 inches, 2 at 17 inches and 3 at 18 inches During these surveys

survey of which 8 were under 16 inches, 2 at 17 inches, and 3 at 18 inches. During these surveys, bullheads were also removed, and the numbers of young bullheads are definitely down. Only 4 smaller adult bullheads were caught with 1 being 6 inches and 3 were around 9 inches. This is good evidence that the Lake Metonga Association is doing its part with removing baby bullheads.

This spring through July 4, Mike Preul and his crew from Mole Lake Fisheries had to work

Loons Fall 2025

he summer started off good for the loons on Lake Metonga. The Farmer's Bay and Peterson's Bay loon nests were put in place after ice out, and not long after they were occupied by territorial loon pairs. The loons in Farmer's Bay hatched two chicks June 5th. However, the Peterson's Bay pair did not hatch any chicks but did return to the nest to try again. Unfortunately, this hatching was not successful. This is likely due to the pair being older.

The Farmer's Bay chicks have been doing exceedingly well and almost fully "fledged," as they have been diving since the end of July.

Throughout the summer we have averaged five to seven floater loons at a time. These loons do not have territory on the lake, so they may come and go throughout the summer and form groupings. With the summer coming to a close, we will see more loons briefly stopping on the lake to rest before continuing their southward push to the Gulf of Mexico. Our loon pairs with chicks will disband in September, with the parents leaving before the chicks. The chicks will need slightly more time to grow before they finally leave around the beginning of October, at which time they will be considered "fledged" and have successfully survived the summer season.

In November, our annual reporting logs and data will be shared with the Loon Watch program that is being restructured by volunteers with the former Northland College Loon Watch

hard to remove adult bullheads. They spent approximately 25 hours shocking and are catching the bigger adults averaging 12.1 inches and average 1.2 pounds. Total number of adult bullheads this spring was 2,242 with total pounds of 2,629 removed. This is also a good sign that our efforts of collecting bullhead eggs and fry are eliminating the younger adults.

Our collection site numbers are: 57 adults, 24,000 eggs and 47,874 fry collected. We know that many of you are collecting the eggs, fry, and adults and disposing of them, deciding not to bring them to the collection site. AND that is OK.


The numbers above and seeing less and less schools of the bullhead are GOOD SIGNS that our efforts are working!

But we cannot stop! All of us have invested a lot of time and resources the past 5 years in getting the bullhead numbers down and we cannot let the lake go back to the way it was!
